Assessment Form: Summative

Type of Assessment: Selected Response and Constructed Response

Duration: 20 minutes

Standard (s) Assessed: SS.A.1.1.1.2.1, SS.A.3.1.2.2.1, SS.B.2.1.1.2.1, Information Managers, and Critical and Creative Thinkers.

Description of Assessment Activity:

Students demonstrate understanding of ways climate, location, and physical surrounding affect the way people live and knowledge of some works of art that reflect the cultural heritage of the community or country by choosing selected responses. Students will complete constructed responses to demonstrate knowledge of similarities and differences among selected Native American cultures from different regions and times.

Teacher Directions: Download and make copies of Summative 4, one per student (see extensions). Staple papers. Read directions and assessment items for each page to students. Allow time for students to complete a page before moving on to the next page.
