### Story Grammar Retelling Chart

<b>Setting and Characters</b>	<b>Once upon a time three Billy Goats lived together in a valley.</b>
<b>Story Problem</b>	<b>They wanted to go up to a meadow to eat grass and daisies but a mean, ugly Troll lived under a bridge they had to cross.</b>
<b>Episode 1</b>	<b>The youngest Billy Goat Gruff tells the Troll to wait for his bigger brother and gets across the bridge.</b>
<b>Episode 2</b>	<b>The second Billy Goat Gruff tells the Troll to wait for his bigger brother and gets across the bridge.</b>
<b>Episode 3</b>	<b>The third Billy Goat Gruff fights with the Troll and tosses him into the water.</b>
<b>Resolution of Problem</b>	<b>The third Billy Goat Gruff crosses the bridge and joins his brothers in the meadow.</b>
<b>Reactions of characters</b>	<b>The three Billy Goats Gruff are happy because they eat until they get fat.</b>

Story Grammar Elements	All story grammar elements included. All story grammar elements correctly identified.	All story grammar elements included. All but one or two story grammar elements correctly identified.	Several story grammar elements are incorrect or missing.
Sequence	All story grammar elements stated in sequence.	Most story grammar elements stated in sequence.	Several story grammar elements stated out of sequence.
Sentence Structure	Each element stated in complete sentence. Includes transition words (first, next, finally, etc.) Includes language from original text (repetitive phrases, descriptive terms, etc.)	All but one or two elements stated in complete sentences. Includes either some transition words or some language from original text.	Many elements stated in incomplete sentences.
