

## Organization of Nations

Objective: The exam format is meant to teach the students about different regions, countries and their belief systems. After preparing for the exam, the students will understand that there may be different views to the same issues depending on your belief systems.

Requirements:

1. You will use the learned information to become an ambassador to that country. During the final exam, you will represent that country.
  - a. You will give a five minute summary of your country: Discussing the five themes of geography, your countries origins and its brief history.
  - b. You will answer specific questions about your country on paper.
  - c. You will debate current events as an ambassador of your country.
  - d. **REMINDER: Your answers will reflect the attitudes and beliefs of your country.**
  - e. Typed 12 fonts, double-spaced.
2. Research Project (Put all researched material in this order)
  1. Title Page (Title, name, date)
  2. Table of Contents
  3. This piece of paper
  4. Five themes of geography: Location, Place, Human/Environment Interaction, Movement and Region.
  5. Map of the country (Full page) Capital city, major cities, waterways, bodies of water, states or providences, major physical features.
  6. History of your country: Research the origin and history of your country. **Write a two page summary of the country's history**
  7. Statistic Sheet: Population, Breakdown of population by race and ethnic background, religion, age diversity. Education level, type of education offered and to whom. Average lifespan, birthrate, population increase or decrease. Types of food, clothing and music native to the country. Women's rights
  8. Economic statistic sheet: Gross National Product (GNP), natural resources, percent of goods exported, percent of goods imported, major occupations of the citizens, average family income, average size of the family, bases of national economy, type of economy.
  9. International Relations and regionalism: Research your relationship with other countries. Alliances, treaties, similar belief systems, enemies, recent political and military conflicts and their results. This research will help you form allies during your debates and guide you in your support of other ambassadors during the debates.
  10. Flag of your country: Either copy or draw a full-page flag of your country. On the back of the flag write a half page on its history and meaning.
  11. Works Cited Page: Following the MLA style each source you use must be cited. MLA handout has examples of documenting references.

Topics to be debated: Terrorism, Human Rights such as Gender Equality and Child labor and Nuclear Weapons.
